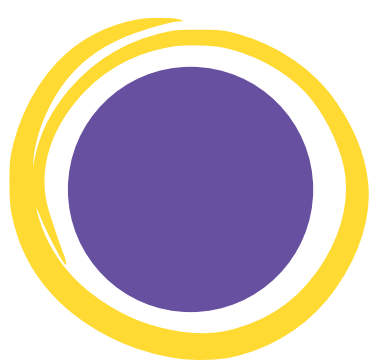
Support

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Your visa belongs to you.

"I will report you to Immigration if you leave me!"

"I can get you deported and our kids will stay here!"

"I will cancel your visa!"

"I can withdraw my sponsorship at any time!"



Other people, including your partner,
CANNOT decide what happens to your visa.

Only the Department of Home Affairs can grant,
refuse or cancel visas.

You can control your visa matters.



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You don't have to stay in an unsafe relationship for a visa.

If you have applied for a permanent visa, you may be able to access the **Family Violence Provisions.**

Even if you're not eligible, you can still contact us about your visa matters.



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
